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PREFACE

This college by name "Dakshin Kamrup College, Mirza" is the result of untiring efforts of some visionary people of the greater South Kamrup area. The college came into existence way back in 1961.

Dakshin Kamrup as the very name indicates, is a vast area of Kamrup District stretching over hundred fifty kilometers along the southern bank of the mighty river Brahmaputra. This rural area has a rich cultural heritage, but its literacy percentage is rather low. Palasbari, famous for Timber and *Muga* industry, is its prime trade centre. But this place too has lost its old glory due to massive erosion caused by the Brahmaputra. The educationists, the social workers and the student community of this locality in particular along with the help and good will of other people of Dakshin Kamrup had long felt the need of spreading higher education in this area and their dream was fulfilled when this college came into existence on November 14, 1961. During those days this was the only institution for higher education in this vast rural area. Thus, the college has fulfilled the long cherished hopes and aspirations of the people of Dakshin Kamrup.

Today this college, humble though its beginning was, has grown into a full-fledged one. It provides the students with all facilities for pursuit of knowledge. It is now flourishing not only as an academic institution, but also as a centre for sports and culture.

The college is located at Mirza, which was an ideal village at the time of its establishment and today it is a fast growing and expanding township with many private sector higher educational institutions. Mirza is about 35 km to the west of Guwahati City in the District of Kamrup. The National Highway No. 37 runs through it. The catchments area surrounding Mirza comprises a vast area touching the river Brahmaputra on the North. The Meghalaya border is about 25 km in south and the district of Goalpara is about 120 km west of it.

The college emblem bears a significant meaning. The blooming lotus that dominates the emblem symbolizes quality and excellence in education. The strands of paddy stand for prosperity and happiness, indicating the economic base of the region. The lotus is surrounded by a circular band on which is engraved the name of the college and its motto, "Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya" - leads us unto light from darkness. The motto stands for 'Enlightenment' to be achieved for leading a purposeful life in the world.

The college aims at achieving human excellence in the field of higher education ensuring all round development of personality of the students- physical, intellectual and moral. The famous *Upanisadic* hymn-"*Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya*"- lead us unto light from darkness- engraved in the college emblem, signifies the motto of the college.

The college has a vision to fulfill. It wants to become the centre of excellence in North East India. Apart from imparting education, it wants the young generations to remake a society based on equality, justice, dignity of labour, morality and spiritual virtues of the individuals. It wants the students to learn that it is not scientific progress alone, but the synthesis of both scientific progress and spiritual power of man that could open out vistas of human endeavour and achievement, paving the way for a better world to live in.

The enthusiasm and pace towards progress were in no way hindered due to the humble beginning of the institution. In 1967, the college was affiliated to Gauhati University and in 1972 it was brought under deficit grants-in-aid system of the Assam government. The science section was introduced in 1979 and brought under the same funding scheme in 1987. Beginning modestly, the college has now provincialized under the Govt. of Assam on 01-01-2006 and grown to the present status of a full-fledged institution. Today the college has 2019 regular students on the rolls, 14 departments (Arts and Science) offering both major and general courses of study and 95 experienced teachers. The Governing Body is the overall managing authority of the college. The Principal is the head of the institution. He has under him 62 non-teaching employees. The college functions according to the Assam Provincialized College Management Rules of 2006.

Dakshin Kamrup College has satisfactory infrastructural facilities- a well-stocked library, a separate administrative building, a Boys' common room, a Girls' common room, an well built Girls' hostel, the science departments with laboratories and classrooms and a canteen etc. Besides these, a big plot of 26 *bighas* (3.48 hectares) has enriched the college assets where a 50 seated Boys' hostel, a big playground, a fishery and a plot of land for plantation project exist. For the maintenance of the above mentioned infrastructures and for other academic and administrative financial requirements, the college requires support from the state Government and also from the UGC. Occasional financial help is also received from public donations and from local M.L.As and M.Ps.

The college has so far succeeded in facilitating advancement and dissemination of quality education. Many students have completed their courses of study in this college with academic distinction and established themselves as able and responsible citizens of the nation. But education is a dynamic process that needs renovation and upgradation, so as to meet the needs of a changing society. Therefore, to meet the challenges in education in the 21st century and to contribute to the knowledge-based economy, the

college has proposed to prepare itself aptly. As a part of this preparation, it has initiated the process of formulation of a strategic plan and identified some areas of strength and weakness. The college desires to get itself assessed and accredited by the NAAC for the Second Cycle so as to upgrade its B⁺ status conferred by NAAC in 2004.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY: SWOC ANALYSIS OF THE COLLEGE

Dakshin Kamrup College is a pioneering centre of higher education situated on the southern bank of the mighty river Brahmaputra, popularly known as "Dakshin Kamrup" (South Kamrup). Dakshin Kamrup is the southern part of the district of Kamrup in the state of Assam stretching over an area of 2322.67 Sq. km (approx.) along the river Brahamputra supported by 35 feeder High and Higher Secondary schools. The college is located at Mirza which has developed from a village into a small but planned township having all civic amenities and good communication facilities. The college is about 7 km away from Lokopriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport and 15 km from Gauhati University to the west. The national highway Nö 37 runs through it.

Dakshin Kamrup includes five revenue circles, namely Palasbari, Chhaygaon, Chamaria, Boko and Nagarbera. The whole area comprises a huge number of population out of which 90.63% live in the rural areas and only 9.37% are urban dwellers. The average literacy rate of South Kamrup area is 73.18%, of which 78.81% are male while female literacy constitutes 67.27% (according to 2011 census).

Mirza is under Palasbari Revenue Circle that covers an area of 298.80 Sq. Km, comprising of 219 villages of which 106 are tribal villages. The percentages of Scheduled Caste (SC) and Scheduled Tribes (ST) population are 17.54% and 12.72% respectively. The major commercial activities of the area include house building materials like sand, bricks etc. and handloom industries. The area is industrially backward but recently ONGC has established a Natural Gas Bottling Plant at Mirza, about 2 km west from the college site.

1. BOUNDARY OF THE COLLEGE CAMPUS

The total land area of the college is 46 *bighas* (6.35 acres) of which 20 *bighas* are in the college campus and 26 *bighas* in the Boys' Hostel campus. The college campus is well protected by a concrete wall. A brief description of the boundary is given below:

- (i) **East:** The east is covered by a small village and a part of *Mailata* hill. The hill is covered by unique floristic composition, covering some economically important medicinal plants and remains green throughout the year.
- (ii) **West:** The west is bounded by Mirza-Rajapara road which runs in front of the college gate. Some small shops and business enterprises are situated next to the road.
- (iii) **North**: The 37th National Highway runs north to the college campus. Also a '*Puja Mandap*' and a market are situated on the northern side. The market becomes functional in evening hour every day.
- (iv) **South:** The South is covered by a portion of *Māilata* hill. On the slopes of the hill, the college authority has taken up Teak plantation.

2. THE BOYS' HOSTEL CAMPUS

The Boys' Hostel is a big Assam Type building which can accommodate 50 (fifty) boarders at a time. The hostel campus is very spacious and consists of a playground

and a big tank which is used for fish rearing. Presently a considerable portion of the land (18 *bighas*) is under preparation for commercial and medicinal tree plantation.

3. SWOC ANALYSIS

(a) **Strength:** The strength of the college may be mentioned in terms of (i) Physical properties, (ii) Material properties and (iii) Human properties.

i. Physical properties:

- A total of 46 bighas of land of which
 - o 20 bighas are in the main college campus.
 - o 26 bighas are in the Boys' hostel campus.
- One big Fishery protected with boundary walls
- One big playground
- 18 bighas of projected plantation area approximately
- Existing plantation by the Social Forestry Department surrounding the college and hostel campus.

ii. Material properties:

Administrative block: The newly constructed two storied Administrative block is a spacious RCC building. It houses the following in the ground floor:

- College office
- College canteen

And in the first floor it houses the following:

- Principal's office
- Conference Hall
- Teachers' common room

GB room: A special GB room is provided for holding GB meeting.

Science building: A new science block (3-storied RCC building) is constructed and presently it accommodates four full fledged departments viz. zoology, Botany, Mathematics and Education. An Institutional Biotech Hub with modern equipment is also accommodated in the Science Block. Of course there are two separate buildings for Physics and Chemistry departments.

Building for general class rooms (Assam type buildings): There are all together 25 rooms in this part of old Assam type buildings to conduct the general theory classes.

Library and Computer Science Building: This is also a three-storied RCC building comprising central library, reading rooms, librarian's office, Computer Science department with class rooms (for computer classes only). In the library there exist the following assets.

Health Centre: The college has a health centre with temporary doctor and nurses along with First Aid facilities.

Boys' hostel: The Boys' hostel is a big Assam-type Building with all facilities and accommodation for 50 boarders at a time.

Girls' hostel: The Girls' hostel is a big RCC building within the main campus with all modern facilities, which can accommodate 40 students. Again there is a separate Assam type quarter for the hostel superintendent of the girls' hotel. Also, adjacent to the Girls' Hostel, there is a separate room for the visitors.

Auditorium: The construction work of a modern auditorium is in progress and expected to be completed very soon.

Sports complex: The college has a big play ground in the Boys' hostel campus besides indoor and outdoor sports complex in the main college campus.

Fishery: In the campus where the Boys' Hostel is located, there is a big tank for rearing fishes. The college is expected to earn a handsome amount from the fishery.

Power supply: To overcome the problem of erratic electric power supply, three high capacity silent generators are installed in the college campus. Moreover, the college installed transformer and electricity transmission line at its own initiative and expenditures inside the college campus.

New class rooms: As many as 4 classrooms have been newly constructed to accommodate the growing number of students. With this, the total number of classrooms is raised to 35.

Gardens: Two gardens have been newly prepared by the financial support of local donors. A good number of well tiled park benches are also constructed for students to spend their leisure periods.

CCTV: The institution installed 16 numbers of CCTV to monitor and record the movement of students and others.

Statue: The college has founded statues of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, founder Principal Late G.N. Thakuria and altars like *Swahid Bedi*, college flag hoisting pillar and alters of NSS unit of the college.

Roads: The two entry gates are connected with concrete and weather proof roads and the by-lane to library and Girls hostel are also constructed in the similar ways.

Boundary wall: The whole college campus is well protected by boundary wall. Some parts of the wall are engraved with local folk art form sponsored by the local alumni. The boundary walls around the Boys' Hostel campus including the fishery have been completed.

Deep tube well: To remove the hurdles of drinking water shortage, a deep tube well has been installed in the college campus to supplement the drinking water facility. A few water coolers and water purifiers have been placed at different points for the benefit of students and teachers.

(b) Weaknesses:

- i. Insufficient number of teachers in some departments against sanctioned post.
- ii. No separate examination hall.

- iii. The new and modern auditorium is under construction. Since the construction work is not yet finished, therefore till date there is a lack of auditorium.
- iv. No recreation room for teachers.

(c) Opportunities:

- i. Opportunities for opening up vocational training through Carpentry, Rural handicrafts, Horticulture, Floriculture, Mushroom culture etc.
- ii. Plantation can be further intensified in college and hostel campus to generate resources in future.
- iii. Undertaking projects by different departments under UGC, DST and other guiding agencies.
- iv. Undertaking action-researches for solving intra-college problems.
- v. Opportunity to start PG courses in many departments.
- vi. Opportunity to start B.Sc. course in Biotechnology since the Biotech Hub is already established.

(d) Challenges:

- i. Lack of placement opportunities for degree holders
- ii. Meritorious students of the locality prefer to admit themselves in the city based colleges since it is very nearer to Guwahati.
- iii. For the restriction of the parent University the college is not capable to introduce new job oriented courses.
- iv. Because of the very tight academic schedule and lack of infrastructure (research grade) faculty members lag behind in research activities in the college.

4. FUTURE EXPANSION PLAN

- i. Opening up of relevant vocational courses.
- ii. Undertaking Minor and Major Research projects.
- iii. Improvement of Boys' hostel.
- iv. Further extension of Girls' hostel.
- V. Improvement of playground.
- vi. Further plantation in the college and hostel campus.
- vii. Construction of new building to replace the existing old Gymnasium hall and also the Boys' common room.
- viii. The college authority proposes to introduce PG courses in political science, education and zoology etc.
 - ix. To start commerce stream in near future.

5. CONCLUSION

The D.K. College has hitherto been playing a significant role in this region promoting collegiate education and individual research activities in Arts and Science. The college is planning to produce skilled manpower. The college authority has proposed to introduce Post Graduate courses gradually in all departments. Several strategies will also be taken

for achieving greater efficiency, accountability and quality in all spheres of activities. Student feedback system will further be extended to the Alumni of D.K. College. Students will be put on the gear and emphasis will be on "learning by doing" through project, field work, seminars, case studies, group discussion and practical training etc. Computerization of academic, administrative and financial activities are also very much in its agenda for the future.

The college identifies its strength and notices its weakness. In the coming years the college will make sincere effort to overcome the weakness and will positively contribute towards improvement in the quality of education. With proper direction and due recognition from NAAC and UGC with the implementation of its future master plan the college will be well-equipped to meet the challenges in education in the coming years and to contribute to the emerging knowledge-based economy.

CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

- 1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.
- ♦ The vision of the college centres round its strong desire to become a centre of excellence in the academic field of the entire North Eastern region. Apart from imparting education, it endeavours to motivate the young generation to establish a social order based on dignity of labour as well as on moral and spiritual values.

The mission of the college is not only to achieve excellence in the field of higher education but also to promote physical, intellectual and moral development of the students. The famous hymn of the Upanishada- "Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya"-engraved in the emblem of the college reflects very distinctively the mission of the college. It has always endeavoured to drive away the darkness of ignorance and usher in the light of knowledge.

The objectives of the institution are to impart futuristic education and instilling high standards of discipline among its students. Moreover, it aims to foster scientific and rational temperament among its students and faculty members which will greatly benefit socio-economically the whole of South Kamrup area to which the college is delegated in particular and the whole mankind in general.

The vision, mission and objectives of the college are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders through various fruitful exercises. Firstly, all are made to realize their responsibility in making Dakshin Kamrup College, Mirza one of the best institutions of higher education in North East India. Secondly, the college steadfastly upholds highest standards of moral and spiritual values so that everyone associated with it are encouraged to follow suit. Thirdly, by organizing social service camps and associating itself with various programmes through outreached activities. The college endeavours to inculcate the sense of social responsibility and the dignity of labour among the people living in the catchment areas of the college.

- 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).
- ♦ For the effective implementation of the curriculum, the institution develops and deploys a number of action plans. Firstly, the college takes feedback from the faculty members, students, guardians and academic peers on the design and structure of the curriculum. Then books, journals and other necessary teaching materials are procured. Seminars and workshops are also organized to devise effective means for the proper implementation of the curriculum. Teachers are also encouraged to make use of ICT as a tool to support traditional subjects of the curriculum.

Here we may take the case of the Dept. of English as an example to illustrate the process. As soon as the new Semester Syllabus was introduced by Gauhati University, the department of English of the College made a thorough analysis of the curriculum. Teachers and students of the department as well as some guardians were part of this exercise. The department also communicated

with the English Dept. of the University to get clarification about certain points. Then some teachers of the dept. were sent to the workshops organised by the University (for the Functional English curriculum of B.Sc. classes) and colleges (for the General English curriculum of B.A. Classes) to get acquainted with the method of effective implementation of the curriculum. After this the Dept. began to procure books and journals recommended by the University. As the Department felt that certain film CDs and DVDs would be helpful in fulfilling the objectives of the new curriculum, film shows have been utilized for teaching-learning process.

In the other areas covered by curriculum such as games and sports, music and culture and physical awareness the college provides encouraging back-up in the form of a full-fledged department (The department of Physical and Sports department) under a qualified and full-time lecturer. This department develops its own courses of actions in different fields of activities. The students of the college have earned laurels at different university level competitions. In a chained-activities the trained students have started imparting their skills in their respective areas and thereby efforts of the college has been taken upto the interior areas of the locality.

- 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?
- ♦ For effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices the teachers receive support from the institution such as-
 - Permission to attend seminars/workshops about best teaching practices.
 These also include Refresher Courses, Orientation Courses preferably of interdisciplinary nature.
 - All-round support, including financial and logistic, to organize lectures/seminars/workshops regarding effective delivery of the curriculum and improving teaching practices.
 - Supply of books, journals and other teaching materials required for effective delivery of the curriculum.
 - Free access to the internet.
 - Construction of smart class rooms for effective teaching.
- 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.
- ◆ D.K. College, Mirza has taken up a number of initiatives for the effective curriculum delivery and transaction of the curriculum provided by Gauhati University- the affiliating university of the College. As the new curriculum provided by the university is based on the Semester system, the college has taken its own initiative to train the faculty members about the various aspects of teaching and evaluation in the new system. The college has also trained its non-teaching stuff about the semester course. The college has introduced the system of taking regular feedback about the courses from the students and the teachers and shares them with the University. The college also supports the efforts of the departments to invite resource persons/ experts to deliver talks to the students so

that they can gather information from a wide spectrum of resources. The College has made internet access free to the students in order to enable them to browse through the huge storehouse of information available about the curriculum. For other areas of the curriculum the college has a vast network of activities which are mentioned elsewhere in this report.

- 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?
- Like most other colleges of Assam, D.K. College, Mirza, also does not enjoy much opportunity to interact with beneficiaries such as industry and research bodies in effective operationalisation of the curriculum. However, the College plays an active part in sharing all feedback regarding the curriculum with the University. Moreover, the College makes it a point to offer suggestion to the University regarding the formulation of future curriculum.
- 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University?(number of staff members/departments represented on the Board of Studies, student feedback, teacher feedback, stakeholder feedback provided, specific suggestions etc.
- ◆ The Institution has made contribution to the curriculum design and development process of Gauhati University. At present, there are two teachers of the college who are members of different committees related to curriculum design of the University. Dr. J.K. Das was a member of the Academic Council of the University in 2010 while Mr. M.P. Baruah was a member of the Syllabus Committee of the Dept. of Political Science in 2012. Also Dhiraj Das, HoD, department of Computer Science is also a member of syllabus committee of the Computer Science department of Gauhati University. Apart from that some of the senior faculty is serving as question setter in various examinations. Again almost all the faculties are serving as examiners and scrutinizers in various examinations of the University.

Moreover, the college takes regular feedback from the faculty members, students, guardians, stakeholders and academic peers on the design and structure of the curriculum. Seminars and workshops are also organized to analyze the merits and demerits of the curriculum. The conclusions drawn from such exercises are then forwarded to the proper statutory academic bodies for necessary action.

- 1.1.7 Does the institution develop curriculum for any of the courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating university) by it? If 'yes', give details on the process ('Needs Assessment', design, development and planning) and the courses for which the curriculum has been developed.
- ♦ Yes. The Institution develops the curricula of the different three months Certificate Courses. At present D.K. College is offering three months Certificate Courses in Sericulture, Apiculture, Spoken English, Refrigeration and Airconditioning, Fishery and Poultry Farming and the curricula of these courses are developed by the concerned faculty members of the College. However, in developing the curricula, a meticulous process is followed. First of all, for each course content, Needs Assessment is done. Here the opinions of different stakeholders are taken into account and the main objectives are set. A thorough

review is done as to how the job prospect of the trainees can be brightened. The next phase is the design part. Here the syllabi are designed with inputs from experts in the field. Then the syllabi are developed and planned for their effective implementation. After this the course materials are developed with active participation of experts from the respective field/industry and the curricula are completed in a time-bound manner.

- 1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?
- ◆ The institution ensures that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course implementation through a stocktaking exercise. Every year it is thoroughly analyzed how many students have passed a particular examination conducted by the university. The overall performance of the students in a particular examination is also evaluated. The number of students getting seats in institutions of higher education through national level admission tests and the number of students getting jobs also give an indication of whether or not the College has been able to fulfill the objectives of the curriculum.

- 1.2.4 Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.
- ◆ The college has introduced PGDCA as one of the self financing course. Of course except the money matter, all other things like syllabus, conduct of examination etc are controlled and managed by the parent University.
- 1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.
- ♦ Yes. In addition to the different Certificate courses in Sericulture, Apiculture, Spoken English, Refrigeration and air-conditioning, fishery and poultry-farming, the college is running other skill oriented programmes such as P.G.D.C.A. from 2004 and B.C.A. from 2007. Similarly, B.Sc., IT has also been introduced as a subject of study in college from 2012. All these courses are under Gauhati University and the beneficiaries are not only the students of the college, but also outsiders including job-holders.
- 1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice" If 'yes', how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?
- ♦ No. The University does not provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

- 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?
- ♦ The Institution makes a continuous effort to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and the Institution's goals and objectives are integrated. As Most of the students of the college come from the lower rung of the society, the college endeavours to help them in every way to shine in life. They are introduced to various career options through Career

Information Guidance Cell. Vocational training in computer application, Spoken English, Air-conditioning and Refrigeration, Folk Education of South Kamrup, Tourism and Hospitality Management, Fishery, Sericulture, Apiculture etc. are offered at a nominal fee. Remedial classes are arranged for the weaker students. As a result of all these endeavours, lots of students of the college have got jobs both in the government departments and in industrial sectors. In fact, the college has successfully fulfilled its duty of producing qualified, job-ready graduates including those who are interested to pursue higher studies for the benefit of the society.

- 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?
- ◆ Although the institution is not authorized to modify the curriculum, it tries to enrich the curriculum. Thus, for the self development of the students, there are certain academic programmes such as study tours, excursions, field trips etc. Departmental seminars, symposia and workshops are made part of the class routine so that the students get opportunity to develop their hidden talent. The Career Information Guidance Cell organizes training programmes, workshops, lectures etc. for the students in order to make them aware of the needs of the dynamic employment market.
- 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?
- ♦ In order to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environment Education, Human rights etc. into the curriculum, the institution makes use of different methods. Lecture Programmes and Seminars have been organized to sensitize the students about Gender discrimination and Human Rights.

Every year, World Environment Day is observed in the College with adequate importance. Generally the college with the initiative of Assam Science Society, Mirza branch observes some programmes like Poster-Writing Competitions, Essay Writing Competitions and Tree Plantation Programmes on this day so as to make the students aware of different environmental issues.

An attempt has also been made to integrate ICT as a tool to support traditional subjects of curriculum. A computer set has been provided to each department. Various types of educational software are used in teaching. Internet connection is also available in the college for the benefit of the teachers and students. Teachers are encouraged to make use of OHP, LCD projector and other available multimedia resources so that teaching-learning becomes more effective and enjoyable.

- 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?
 - Moral and Ethical Values
 - ◆ Although there are no separate value-added courses or enrichment programmes on moral and ethical values, the college organizes programmes

on moral and ethical values, Indian traditional values etc. in collaboration with organizations such as Vivekananda Kendra, Sri Sri Satya Sai Sevashram etc. These programmes include lectures, essay writing competitions, quiz competitions etc.

- Employable and Life Skills
- ◆ The Career Information Guidance Cell of the College organizes training programmes on soft skill development, spoken English etc. to enhance the employability of the students and their life skill.
- Better Career Options
- ◆ The Career Information Guidance Cell of the College, again, plays a leading role in acquainting the students with better career options through different programmes.
- Community Orientation
- ◆ For the community orientation of the students the College holds different programmes. The College has adopted the village Gorgora under Palasbari Sub-division of Kamrup District and the teachers and the students are actively involved to offer a helping hand in the all-round development of the village. The College, with active participation of the student community, organizes periodic health check-up programmes, free tuition programmes for the brilliant students of this backward and remote village. The College also organizes blood donation camps regularly besides sending flood relief teams to help the needy and the distraught people of different flood affected areas of the state.
- 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?
- The College takes regular feedback from its different stakeholders such as the faculty members, students, guardians and academic peers on the design and structure of the curriculum. In the feedback taking exercise after the introduction of the semester system, it was observed that a large majority of the respondents wanted better library facilities, free internet access etc. for the effective delivery of the curriculum as well as for its enrichment. So the College authority immediately digitized the library, made internet access free for the students and procured other latest teaching materials. A few smart classes were also constructed. Teaching with the help of OHP is now a normal activity in the College. In fact, the College authority makes an extensive use of the feedback taken from different stakeholders in enriching the curriculum.
- 1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?
- ♦ The College has a committee under the chairmanship of the Principal of the College to regularly monitor and evaluate the quality of the enrichment programmes. The committee takes feedback from the participants of theses enrichment programmes regarding their effectiveness. Experts from different fields are also consulted to evaluate the quality of the programmes.

1.4 Feedback System

- 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?
- ♦ Based on the feedback from its different stakeholders, D.K. College has made contribution to the curriculum design and development process of Gauhati University. The conclusions drawn from feedback taking exercises regarding the needs and aspirations of the stakeholders about the curriculum are forwarded to the proper statutory academic bodies for necessary action. At present, there are two teachers of the college who are members of different committees related to curriculum design of the University .They also play a role in the design and development of the curriculum.
- 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If 'yes', how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?
- ♦ Yes. There is a Feedback Committee in the college. Principal is the Chairman of this Committee. There are five members from the teaching faculty, two members each from the non-teaching faculty and the Students' Union. The Committee is responsible for analyzing the feedback data by applying various statistical methods. The Committee places its findings to the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College. The Feedback Committee also ensures that the outcome/suggestions are communicated to the affiliating university through its members in the different committees of the university.

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the College, based on the feedback inputs, decides how to make use of the findings for the continuous improvement of the different aspects of the curricula. The feedback also reflects on the needs and aspirations of the students, guardians and other members of the society and this acts as the leading light in taking decisions regarding the introduction of new courses and programmes in the College.

- 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)
- ♦ The only programme introduced in the College under Gauhati University in the last four years is B.Sc. I.T in 2012. The rationale behind the introduction of this course was the great demand among the students. It was hoped that by introducing this programme, the College would be able to impart high quality computer education to the students of South Kamrup.

The College has also opened a study centre of K.K. Handique State Open University in 2008. The programmes offered through it are B.A.; B.P.P.; B.C.A.; B.M.C.; B.B.A. and M.A. The rationale for introducing these programmes was to make education accessible to the disadvantaged group of the society and help in bringing equity. This centre has proved quite popular with those who cannot afford regular education because of various limitations.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

- 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?
- ♦ The college ensures publicity and transparency in the admission process by various ways. Admission notice is published in the notice board and college website, which is open to all. Moreover all information regarding admission is made transparent by distributing college prospectus.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
- The admission process is started with the constitution of an admission committee which is convened by the Principal. The committee frames up the admission criteria and finally circulates the admission notice in college website and notice board and prospectus is distributed with admission forms. Admission forms are sort-listed and a merit list against total number of seats is notified prior to the admission. Further the names, marks secured in the qualifying examination and the names of the institution last attended are announced through a public address system one by one in the admission hall. Candidates and their guardians are allowed free entry into the admission hall. The interested candidates report for admission. The process continues till all the seats are filled. Thus admission process is completed strictly on merit basis. Govt. instruction regarding reservation is strictly followed.
- 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.
- ♦ There is no limit of maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for any programme. The minimum cut off percentage for admission in general courses are 40% for major and 30% for general subjects. The professional courses like BCA, PGDCA are self financing in nature but admission are also based either on merit or first come first serve basis. Vocational courses like Apiculture, Refrigeration and Air conditioning etc also follow either on merit or first come first serve basis.
- 2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If 'yes' what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?
- ♦ Yes, The admission process and the student profiles are annually reviewed in the Academic Council meeting as well as in the Admission Committee meeting. Necessary changes in existing rules and framing up of new criteria are made if needed. As a result of such review admission process is gradually becoming more transparent, quick and democratic. Flexibility in combination of subjects, on the spot issue of I-cards, Registration forms of Council/University, circulation of

college rules and regulations through academic prospectus, academic calendar, counseling and screening test for major subjects etc are some of the major out come of such review of admission process. These ample of review have greatly contributed to the improvement of a quick, justifiable, transparent and student-friendly admission process, as a result of which the enrollment of student is gradually increasing.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

- 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?
- As the enrollment of the differently-abled student is a very rare case, the college has no any specific provision to fostering the need of such category. However, the college is liable to be adherent to Govt. instructions in this concern, whenever such student is admitted. One hearing impaired girls student enrolled in 2009 was provided with sufficient notes and reading materials by the Education department.
- 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.
- There is no such programme. But in some departments test examinations are taken after admission in to the major subjects to assess their aptitude and writing skill. On the basis of that in class room, counseling is provided to the needy students. Some of the science departments send their faculty members to arrange popular talk/science classes in the nearby H.S. Schools to popularize science.
- 2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.
- ◆ Periodical Unit test, Class test are held in the major and general courses to identify the slow and advanced learners. Besides this, feedback is also taken from the students at the end of every chapter or unit. The slow learners are treated with extra care by providing them remedial classes. Necessary mentoring is also done by the teachers of the respective departments. Besides the above efforts, Remedial courses for SC/ST students as per the Govt./UGC scheme are arranged to abridge the knowledge gap of the students. But sanctioning of such scheme lacks regularity. Individual departments sometimes arrange Add-on classes whenever feel necessary.

- 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?
- ♦ The college is a co-educational institution. So there is equal right for both gender of staff or student. There is no gender biasness in case of admission or Students' Union election or in staff recruitment. There are separate common rooms and hostels both for boys and girls students. Separate urinal and toilet facilities are available in the college campus. The D.K. College Womens' Forum is eagerly adherent to any grievance redressal raised by any female staff or students. However the college has a general grievance redressal cell to adhere any grievances.

Sensitization regarding inclusion of different categories of staff or students belongs to General, SC, ST, OBC, Physically Handicapped, and Minority etc are always observed strictly according to the Govt. policies in the concerned areas like admission, recruitment of staff, election, excursion, scholarship and the relaxation of norms and dues etc.

To sensitize the environmental awareness among the staff and students the college made enormous efforts. In spite of Govt. silent attitude the college authority appointed two faculty members to teach in the classes of environmental studies. Every student is promised to plant at least a tree plant in their home campus and progress report is verified. In the campus greening scheme, the college authority has already planted several numbers of tree plants. Flower gardening and beautification, naming and labeling of trees with their botanical names under the supervision of Botany department are some of the efforts of environment sensitization in the college. Further, the college authority declared its campus as 'No Smoking Zone' in 2006 and strictly prohibited the use of tobacco, gutkha, pan etc and displayed prohibitory notices. The role of the D.K. College NSS Unit is worth mentioning in cleaning the campus and makes it free from plastic/polythene and other garbage. The college authority accommodates adequate facilities of piped-water supply and sufficient potable drinking water to prevent the misuse of water resources. Almost all buildings are equipped with CFL/Tube light to save electricity.

- 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?
- Advanced learners as well as slow learners are identified by arranging periodical unit test, class test and an evaluation aftermath. Advanced learners are communicated with interaction, instructed with necessary guidelines, text books or references are recommended. Sometimes additional study materials are supplied to them. Their educational needs are tried to be mitigated by personal counseling or group discussion.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?
- ◆ Throughout the programme duration periodical class tests, unit tests etc. are arranged for all students. From the evaluation of these tests necessary data and information regarding their academic performance is collected. Slow and

advanced learners are identified. Remedial courses for the disadvantaged students especially for SC and ST students are arranged. Students from economically weaker sections of the society are encouraged with scholarship, library books, uniforms, fees relaxation etc. to check the risk of dropout. Student Aid Fund of the college provides ample of help for such students.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

- 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)
- The college keeping pace with the Gauhati University academic calendar publishes its prospectus and academic calendar annually in the month of March. In this calendar date of commencement of the session, admission into different classes, different examinations, different holidays, students' union election, different festivities like freshers' social, college foundation day, annual college week, Saraswati puja etc. are scheduled. Seminars, conference, debating etc. are occasionally arranged as per the convenience of regular schedule. The teaching plan is prepared by the individual department under the guidance of concerned heads of the department. Striking features of the annual teaching plan highlight the number of working days, teaching days, and holidays along with a monthly schedule of course distribution for the teacher. Further more records of home assignment, unit test, sessional examination, test examination, tutorial classes, excursion, field work/project works are also included in the teaching plan.

To evaluate the quality of the students especially regarding their skill and knowledge in course contents home assignment, unit test, class-seminar, sessional examination, project works are exercised. However, evaluation of UG students is carried out centrally by the Gauhati University through a semester end/final examination. The faculty of the college is involved in the entire evaluation system at different stages by engaging themselves as question setter, invigilators, examiner, external examiner, scrutinizer, head examiner, supervising officer, assistant zonal officer, etc.

However, the college introduces a couple of awards funded by four charitable trusts to encourage the students to perform better quality in internal and final examinations.

- 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?
- ♦ Since its initiation in 2003 the IQAC of the college has been playing an effective role in promoting teaching-learning and evaluation process. IQAC garners information about the drawbacks and requirements in the teaching learning process and makes necessary instructions or advice to the college authority. It insists mainly on the following activities for the improvement of teaching learning process.
 - (i) Monitoring the preparation of annual AQAR submitted to the NAAC.
 - (ii) Regular commencement of internal/external examinations and analysis on evaluation, results etc.
 - (iii) Completion of the curriculum within the planned time-frame of the academic calendar.
 - (iv) Monitoring the infrastructures like sufficient class rooms, library,

- reading rooms, hostels, canteen, drinking water etc.
- (v) Allocation of sufficient funds to the departments for purchasing library books.
- (vi) Sanctioning necessary leave/deputation for faculty improvement programmes.

Some of the important achievements of the IQAC during last few years in improving teaching learning process are mentioned below –

- (a) Installation of CCTV to monitor the campus discipline.
- (b) Introduction and maintenance of a Departmental Class Diary for all departments.
- (c) Introduction of Smart Classes.
- (d) Introduction of computer assisted learning (CAL) and installation of computer sets in all departments.
- (e) Introduction of college awards for rank holders.
- (f) Financial support to poor students.
- 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?
- ◆ Dakshin Kamrup College is affiliated to the Guahati University. Therefore, it does not have the academic autonomy and has to follow the curriculum prepared by the University. So, the college has very limited scope to make the learning student-centric on its own way. However, as mentioned earlier individual requirements of the students are mitigated by the faculty members through appropriate counseling.

The college offers the students a number of vocational courses. It gives an extra edge to the students after graduation in the job market. PGDCA, BCA and a certificate course on computer awareness help the students in acquiring electronic literacy. Apiculture, Sericulture, workshops on Photography and Animation, Refrigeration and Air-conditioning etc are the vocational courses wherefrom students can acquire self reliance and subsistence.

The college organizes different competitive events of sports, culture and literature annually wherefrom excellence of concern fields are encouraged to accelerate their skill like interactive learning, collaborative and independent learning and help them to earn an occupation of such expertise. Election of students' union for legitimate activities, participation in youth festivals and different competitive programmes outside the campus, membership of NSS etc. have the plausible opportunities to establish the students in different avenues with acquisition of life skill, knowledge management and life long earnings.

- 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?
- ♦ It has limited scope to nurture the students for critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper amidst a busy academic schedule. Introduction of vocational courses, Career Counseling and Guidance Cell, recommendation of project report/ field report, laboratory experiment, participation in competitive events of sports, culture and literature, participation in union election, youth festivals, membership of NSS are some of the activities which seemed to emanate creativity, critical thinking and scientific temper of the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators.

- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g. Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
- ♦ Both non-technical and technical facilities are available for effective teaching and learning practices. Though the college lacks technologies like virtual laboratories, NPTEL, NME-ICT etc. various modern electronic apparatus are used for effective learning.

At least sixty percent of the total courses are achieved by lecture method. All most all faculty members follow the lecture method in teaching and learning process. However, chalk and talk method has been traditionally occupying a pivotal place to teach the students with lucid illustrations. Among other methods experimental learning method is frequently practised in the science laboratories through practical classes. Computer assisted -learning is mostly in the use of computer science department. Almost all the departments are well acquainted with project work, field survey, group discussion and week-end seminars. Recently Smart Classes are introduced in the science departments and some faculty members are well trained up to teach the students through this method. The college centrally facilitates a big room(No.8)well equipped with LCD projector, podium with collar microphone to present seminar, group discussion etc. As all the departments are facilitated with computer and printer, students are benefited by study materials in the form of CD, hardcopy etc. College has also internet facilities to collect necessary information and data at global or regional level related to courses of the students of different departments. However, a portion of the faculty is well versed and aptly can use these limited facilities.

Field work is a necessary activity of the curriculum for some departments. Every year various departments organize departmental excursion and field study tour. Very often local sites are selected and surveying, data collection, specimen collection, analysis and report writing are taught systematically and students are made efficient so as to prepare and submit a field report independently. On site experience of the field is seemed to be more beneficial than the theoretical and class room teaching.

The college facilitates a digital Xerox machine in the library. Students have easy access to it and can reproduce any reading materials like text books, reference books etc. collected from library and other sources at a very meager price for their individual use.

A number of departments such as Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Education, Economics, Political Science and Assamese organize departmental seminars for students. Here students are instructed to present papers and also asked to reply suitably against raised questions. Group discussions are also arranged departmentally in the same manner. Seminars, group discussions, guest lecture, popular talk and exhibitions all these activities are organized under the guidance of respective study forums of the various departments.

- 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?
- ♦ Both the students and the faculty members of the institute are updated and upgraded with the recent development of the subjects by the following means:

- (i) By following various rules and regulations imposed by UGC, concerned University, academic council and state and central government from time to time.
- (ii) By purchasing and going through recently published books and journals and sophisticated innovative teaching-learning apparatus/tools.
- (iii) Organizing and attending seminars and workshops etc.
- (iv) Browsing various necessary websites.
- (v) Individual media alertness.
- (vi) Keeping contact with libraries in / outside college.
- 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?
- ♦ All students earn academic support and guideline by the existing academic programmes and remedial classes. Moreover the college has been arranging various programmes on personal, psycho-social support and guidance services annually under the supervision of D.K. College Career Counseling and Guidance Cell where willing students undergo professional counseling in various fields *viz.* skill development, job earning, coaching for competitive test or recruitment drive etc. Details of such counseling programmes are given below.

- 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?
- ◆ Teaching and learning process is mainly based upon chalk and talk method. Yet introduction of Smart Classes, LCD projector, podium with collar microphone etc. are expected to be a better facilities for innovative teaching and learning practices. Though computer aided learning is not common to all, students from Zoology, Botany and Computer science department are expected to be benefited.

Some of the innovation in teaching learning process:

- (i) **Seminar and discussion:** A number of departments *viz.* Education, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Economics regularly organizes departmental seminars every year. The students are encouraged to take part actively in discussion and interaction. In the department of Education seminar is organized with panel discussion. Two or three teachers panel help in clearing the doubts of the students during the presentation of paper.
- (ii) **Group discussion with Report presentation:** This method is usually applied by the teachers of the Education department. In the major classes the students are divided into some groups, a relevant topic is given for discussion and asked to note down the main points by the group leader. After a few minutes of discussion the group leaders are asked to present their report one by one. After presentation of their report the concerned teacher shortlisted the main important points and explains this briefly.
- (iii) **Project works:** Excursion and project works are part of the learning process in subjects like Zoology, Botany, Education, Physics, Chemistry and Political Science. Recently project works have been made compulsory for all subjects in the semester system. A three months certificate course on a project work of Folk Education with Special Reference to South Kamrup Area sponsored by the UGC was made compulsory for the students.
- (iv) **Interdisciplinary Team Teaching:** It is an interesting and attractive method of teaching and learning. The Education department organizes team teaching session once in a year with the help of science faculty.
- (v) **Field Study:** A number of departments viz. Botany, Zoology, Economics, Geography, Education, Assamese and Political Science organize field study for their students. The students have to submit the report on that study.
- (vi) **On the Spot Writing:** To take immediate feed back in written form from the students, most of the departments have practiced this method. Especially the department of Education regularly practices this method.
- 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?
- Library contributes the teaching-learning process in various ways. Students are facilitated with library cards in time of admission. Students who have major get additional library card in the respective subject. Textbook and reference books are issued for 15 days and are asked to renew if necessary. All the departments have their departmental library for the use of both faculty and students. Departmental library contains mainly text books and references. Yet few numbers of national and international journals are kept in some departments. Issuing of books and other reading materials are managed by the departments individually. Return of books to the central library before final examination is compulsory, of course, students may borrow books from departmental library and may return it after the completion of examination. Moreover, students especially having major courses get easy access to go through the books of departmental library.

The college has two reading rooms both for teachers and students except books, references, news papers, magazines, journals of national and international standard are available. It has also subscribed 2 e-journals and installed a digital Xerox machine to enable reproduction of study materials. The library has altogether 43544 books 6 magazines, 19 journals and 2 e-journals with computerized cataloging system.

- 2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.
- ◆ D.K. College is situated in a rural area. It has been facing various challenges in completing its curriculum within the designed timeframe of the academic calendar of the college. Some of the important challenges are mentioned below.
 - (a) The college neither can raise the cut-off marks at entry level nor can exclude the II and III division holders by fixing its seats limited to get a quality students, as a good number of students come from the poor school background with different media like Assamese, Bodo, Hindi, English etc whose families altogether at public donated for the foundation of the college in 1961. Therefore, the college has to negotiate with slow learners' entrance. It is not conducive to complete the curriculum within the designed timeframe with maximum slow learners from variety of medium/mother language.
 - (b) Increasing number of enrollment annually has been accelerating more demands for more infrastructure facilities which are not easier to cope with instantaneously. Opening of new/advanced academic programme to face the future challenges needs a better foreseeing.
 - (c) The institution is seemed to be overwhelmed with enumerable programmes/recommendations from various social/Govt./semi-govt. organizations like students' union, board, council, University, UGC, NAAC, State Govt., Central Govt. etc. Besides, flood, political unrest, Govt. election and frequent call for *Bandh* are the major hindrance in timely implementation of the curriculum as designed which is responsible for reducing the total teaching/working days of the college.
 - (d) Number of teaching and non-teaching staff appointed against sanctioned posts is proportionately very low in comparison to the huge number of enrollment. The hostels and Computer Science department are empty of sanctioned staff but full of students.

The institution has left no stone unturned to overcome these challenges. Some of the institutional efforts in this concern are mentioned below.

- (i) The college authority is always busy in enhancing infrastructure facilities by managing funds from every possible sources.
- (ii) Remedial courses, counseling, exchange programmes are arranged to abridge the knowledge gap of slow learners.
- (iii) Appointment of permanent non-sanctioned/temporary/ part-time staff both in teaching and non-teaching category with consolidated pay are a great task of the authority for the time-bound completion of the curriculum.

- (iv) IQAC of the college is in strict vigil in implementing the academic calendar as designed.
- 2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?
- **♦**
- IQAC is kept alert in regular and smooth implementation of the academic calendar.
- Installation/activation of CCTV to monitor students' involvement in regular classes and maintenance of campus discipline.
- Introduction of Departmental Class Diary to monitor teachers' intake of classes as scheduled in the class routine.
- Principal/Vice Principal check-up of daily attendance of teachers with timely arrival and departure.
- Commencement of internal and external examinations as scheduled.
- Declaration of marks/results after evaluation of internal examinations.
- Evaluation feedback is analyzed in the Academic Council and in the IQAC meeting.
- IQAC instructs necessary recommendations to the college authority through Principal.
- Library facilities are examined annually.
- All grievances raised by any stakeholders are tried to be mitigated by the college authority through a grievances redressal system.
- Faculty members are deputed for FIP as per requirement on priority/need basis.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

♦ The college has no such independent strategies of its own to recruit competent teaching faculty. Teachers are recruited strictly according to the latest Govt./UGC rules and regulations which is monitored by the higher education directorate of the State Govt. Introduction of new/advanced course is very tenacious and has to follow rigorous procedure like inspection, permission, concurrence, affiliation etc. The college has appointed 2 (two) faculty members in 2011 to teach in new programmes like BCA, PGDCA and IT (vocational) course in the department of Computer Science. An institutional Biotech Hub is started in 2011 with a trained-up coordinator from the department of Botany and one research assistant is appointed to operate the course as designed. The college has received necessary permission to introduce PG programmes from 2013 in subjects like Assamese and Political Science. Teachers are encouraged to involve in UGC sponsored schemes like minor/major research projects, seminars, workshops, conferences and deputed for any FIP programmes like Ph.D., M. Phil, orientation course, refresher course and short-term course in their concerned fields as necessary.

A spacious green campus with calm academic atmosphere, separate department for each subjects, departmental library, teachers' common room, general conference hall, seminar hall (room no. 8), library books and reading room, parking and canteen facilities are seemed to be enough to attract competent teachers to serve in the institution. Besides the attractive revised UGC pay scale, financial assistance from Employees' Welfare Fund, Credit Societies, regularity in payment of salaries and unbiased friendly attitude of the authority to the teachers are some of the strategies for retention of the competent faculty members in the college. As Govt. has not created any sanctioned posts since 1992, it is difficult to appoint competent teachers at consolidated pay. There is no sanctioned post from the Govt. for a longer span as required in various departments, especially in the department of Computer Science and Environmental Studies in spite of maintaining all requisite norms. For retention of competent teachers in non-sanctioned post, the college enhances the salaries up to Rs. 8000 + and has been raising demands to create new posts by the Govt.

- 2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.
- The college appoints qualified teachers following the same UGC/Govt. guidelines to teach new programmes in the emerging areas like BCA, PGDCA and IT (vocational) course in the department of Computer Science. Two additional faculty members have been appointed during last three years. Courses on Biotech, Bioinformatics etc are not yet introduced though an institutional Biotech Hub has been started in 2011 for three years granted by the Govt. of India under the authority of Science and Technology, Department of Biotechnology, NER division by the Botany department. The college will introduce PG course from 2013 in Assamese and Political Science. Necessary permission from the respective authority has been received and teachers are yet to be appointed.
- 2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

- The college authority usually allows the faculty members to participate in the UGC sponsored orientation/refresher course, seminar, workshop and other FIP programme like M. Phil, Ph.D. etc. so as to accelerate quality and competence in teaching. Willing faculty members seeks permission from the authority for leave to attend such programmes which is considered by the authority on the basis of seniority, priority and necessity. The number of faculty availing these facilities during last four year is 17. In June 2011 the departments of Political Science and Education jointly have organized a national seminar on 'Application of Scientific Tools for Innovative Teaching in Higher Education'. Department of Computer Science offers a certificate course on 'Computer Awareness' both for teachers and students free of cost. Moreover the institution also allows the faculty to avail such programmes conducted elsewhere for computer learning.
- 2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes industrial engagement etc.)

◆ The institution does not have provision for research grants; however, the faculty of the institution avail Minor as well as Major research grants from the funding agencies like UGC. The college follows the rules framed by the UGC in regard to study leave.

The faculty seeks permission for leave to attend national/international conferences/seminar/workshops, training programmes from the authority which are usually granted. The number of faculty who availed these facilities during the last three years is 17. Recently a major research project titled "Establishment of Institutional Level Biotech Hubs (IBT Hubs)" has been granted by the Government of India under the authority of Science and Technology, Department of Biotechnology, NER division amounting a sum of Rs. 27 lacs in the year 2011 to be completed in 2014 under the co-ordination of Dr. D.N. Singha, Assistant Professor of Botany department. Faculty members from various departments such as Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Political Science, Geography and Assamese have been almost regularly publishing text books, reference books and general books for the benefit of students. Moreover, the institution has published three valuable edited books separately on literature, environment and political aspects on the occasion of Golden Jubilee Celebration of the College in November, 2011.

- 2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards/recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contributed to such performance/achievement of the faculty.
- ◆ There is no any such outstanding recipient among the faculty members in state, national or international level for excellence in teaching. But all granted major/minor research projects and conferred degree of Masters, M. Phil and Ph.D. can be considered as the indirect or direct recognition to persistent and creative research activities of the faculty members. At present 22 M. Phil and 17 Ph.D. holders have strengthen the teaching competency of the faculty members. A few numbers of the faculties are recognized by some Universities for research guideship.
- 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?
- Yes, the head of the department takes the feedback from the students. Students of final year UG courses are to submit feedback forms after final examination. The HoD goes through the feedback and conveys the positive as well as negative aspect of the feed back to the faculty concerned. Appropriate steps are suggested to rectify the negative aspects as far as possible. The college is very often visited by external peers and most of them evaluate the teaching-learning process. Right from the Director of Higher Education of State Govt., Inspector of colleges, expert from GU, Council, GU nominee to GB have inspected the college on their scheduled visit. Moreover external examiners, reputed scholars, NAAC Peer team are also invited to visit the college. Visiting reports of all external peers are reviewed in the meeting of GB, academic council and IQAC and necessary strategies are formulated for the improvement in teaching-learning process.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

- 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?
- ◆ It is a general view that any academic programme starts with a designed curriculum and ends with an evaluation process on it. So students or teachers are also generally aware of an evaluation process at the completion of their academic programmes. Entire evaluation procedure of the curriculum is designed and vividly described in the syllabus of the courses published by the Gauahti University to which the college is affiliated. Moreover, time and mode of evaluation to be commenced on, is also published in the academic calendar, college prospectus and through GU notification from time to time.

The college follows two types of evaluation *viz*- internal and external evaluation. Internal evaluations in the form of test exam, sessional exam, unit test, periodical class test, departmental assignment test, laboratory experiment, home work, project work etc are conducted internally by the college/respective departments. External evaluation includes the final examinations at the end of the programme which is notified and conducted by the Gauhati University.

- 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?
- ◆ Gauhati University to which the college is affiliated has entirely reformed its evaluation process in the UG (B.A./B.Sc.) courses in July, 2011. Instead of its three year-end final examination in the TDC (1+1+1) course, it introduced six semester-end final examination at the end of relevant semesters in the TDC semester system. The major evaluation reforms for the UG courses are-
 - (a) Introduction of TDC semester system course instead of TDC (1+1+1) course.
 - (b) Internal evaluation of 20% marks consisting of unit/sessional test, home assignment, seminar and percentage of class attendance.
 - (c) External evaluation of 80% of marks by a semester-end final examination both in theory and practical at the end of a semester.
 - (d) Declaration of final evaluation by choice based Credit and Grade Point Average (CGPA) system.
 - (e) Clearance of all the six semesters successfully within five year is mandatory.

The college has no any scope for any major evaluation reforms of its own as it is affiliated to the Gauhati University and is bound to follow the GU guidelines as well.

- 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?
- ◆ The recent evaluation reforms of the Gauhati University in the newly introduced semester system in undergraduate level are implemented as followed:

Students performance is monitored by internal evaluation (20% marks) and external evaluation (80% marks). Internal evaluation consists of two sessional examination, home assignment, seminars and library works in each semester. External evaluation is monitored through a final examination at the end of a semester. In each paper of each semester student must secure pass mark (30% for

theory and 40% for practical) in both internal and external examination. Students are allowed to 'repeat' any one of the theory papers in 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th semester and also a provision of appearing for betterment in one paper in the 5th semester provided marks secured in the concerned paper is less than 45%. There is no repeat/betterment chance in practical examination in any semester.

A student must pass all semester examinations including repeat/betterment within five years from the date of admission with a maximum of three chances to clear a particular semester.

The final evaluation at the end of the UG programme is declared by the Gauhati University under the 'Regulation of TDC for semester system and with choice based credit and grading system'.(Details of evaluation and choice based credit and grading system are given in the annexure).

However, evaluation through choice based credit and grading system in the TDC course has been introduced from the year 2011-12 as per the guideline of GU regulation.

- 2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.
- To measure the students' achievement various evaluative procedures have been adopted. Sessional examination, unit test, periodical class test, departmental assignment test, laboratory experiment, home work, project work etc are some of the formative evaluative approaches wherein students are given exercise/problems to make solution independently. In these tests their explanatory, writing capacity, creativity etc are monitored and errors committed by them are pointed out and instructed for rectification. Laboratory experiments, field reporting, project reporting etc enhance the students' creativity. Internal evaluations make students involve in identification of problems, rectification of errors and preparation for proper response for such problems. External evaluation/final examinations are however conducted by the University and students are made prepared to appear in these examinations. In true sense the whole teaching-learning and evaluation process itself is a formative or summative approach to acquire life skill for the students.
- 2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievements (Programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.
- ◆ The college conducts various internal examinations independently for the evaluation of students' performance. Students' progress is monitored through class test, unit/sessional tests and test examinations. Two unit/sessional tests are compulsory for the UG students. They are notified at least one week prior to their examination. Then the answer scripts are evaluated by the concerned teachers and subsequently marks are notified. Students are advised to show their mark sheet to their parents/guardians. They are made aware of their mistakes or omissions and encouraged for better enhancement. Answer scripts of sessional examination or unit test are shown to students for rectifications. The unsuccessful and absentee students from the first sitting are recommended to appear the same test for the

second time with necessary guidance. The test examination is conducted just before the final examination in the same manner. Marks obtained by the students are informed by issuing mark sheets individually. Besides, home assignments are recommended and interaction, consultation and necessary guidance are provided to them. The final evaluation of the UG course is carried out centrally by the GU. All the faculty members have to involve in the entire process of conducting examination and evaluation.

The final results are statistically published in the prospectus and college magazine annually so as to communicate students, parents/guardians and other institutional stakeholders. The college toppers are rewarded by the college authority and print their photographs in the college magazine to encourage students for better achievement.

- 2.5.6 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.)
- ◆ Internal evaluations like periodical class tests, home assignment, laboratory experiment, field reporting or project reporting are recommended by the respective departments. Instead of strictures, students are amicably advised and encouraged to take part in such evaluations. Students' performance, especially, in the major subjects are well monitored by individual departments and necessary counseling are provided to rectify their mistakes or omissions. But the college centrally conducts at least two sessional/unit tests for the UG students which is mandatory as per the GU guideline. Though the institute neither can impose rigorous punishment nor can debar the students from appearing in the final examination for not attending in the sessional/unit tests, all the UG students have to appear in these tests where from a percentage of marks are carried over to the final examination in the form of Internal Assessment. Therefore the participation of students in the internal examination is gradually increasing and their response

to the evaluation process is improved significantly. Although appearing in the test examination is not compulsory almost all students (above 90%) eagerly sit in the test examination as they have to incur an examination fees for it. Question papers are prepared in the model format of the final examination. Mark sheets are issued to them and they get an opportunity to identify their strength and weakness in their preparedness to the final examination. Therefore, they appear in the test examination without any rigor.

There is no any reported/known biasness in invigilation or evaluation of answer scripts of the internal examinations. The college is very transparent to students or their guardians in case of internal or external examinations. In the internal examinations mark sheets are issued/notified to the students so as to know their performance. In required circumstances, evaluated answer scripts are shown to the anxious or curious students to maintain transparency in the evaluation process which enhances their confidence upon evaluation process.

Of course, the college has no any specific mechanism to assign weightage for the overall development of the students.

- 2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.
- ♦ Yes, the college as well as individual teachers consider assessment/evaluation as an indication of student's performance. Besides the final examination, Unit/sessional tests and test examination are the best indicator of their performance as marks are given according to their answers written in the answer scripts. Marks scored by them obviously reflect their individual capacity of perceiving, learning and achieving objectives. Other assessment like class test, homework, lab- experiment, field work, project-work etc also reflects their performance in planning and creativity though marks are not taken into consideration.
- 2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?
- ◆ The evaluation of undergraduate programme is carried out centrally by the Gauhati University. As per the University rules an aggrieved student can apply for re-evaluation of papers after paying a nominal fee.

The college has the provision of disclosing evaluated answer scripts of the internal examination to satisfy the students. Furthermore, the facilities of RTI Act for any information are available now.

2.6 Student performance and Learning Outcomes

- 2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?
- ◆ Learning outcomes in the form of results, mark sheets and certificates are clearly stated by the University at the end of every final examination. Moreover students are provided with individual marks in sessional and test examinations. Learning outcomes are also statistically published in the college magazine and college prospectus annually.

- 2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?
- ◆ To achieve the intended learning outcomes the college strictly observes the regular commencement of classes, maintenance of departmental class diary, commencement of internal examinations like unit/sessional examinations, test examinations etc. Students appearance in the examinations, passed and failed statistics are recorded and stored in the college office. However imposition of fine for non-collegiate and discollegiate students and enhancement in cut-off marks in admission would have help in achieving a better learning outcome. Besides Govt. scholarship the college authority introduces various awards of merit for the meritorious students for outstanding performance which may encourage a better learning outcome.
- 2.6.3 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?
- As the college is an affiliated institute of Gauhati University, no such special initiatives have been taken up to enhance social and economic relevance such as quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude etc. Its academic activities are basically course oriented. So students at small scale are instructed/trained up by the Career Counseling and Guidance Cell to get employment opportunities. There is no provision for enhancing research aptitude. However preparation of field study report, project report, and laboratory experiment done by the students may be considered as the first step to ignite their research aptitude.
- 2.6.4 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?
- ◆ Data on learning outcomes are available from the results of any examinations declared by the college or University. Furthermore, departmental faculties collect and analyze the data of student's performance in class works, home works, unit/class tests and make necessary initiatives. The major problems are reported in the meeting of Academic Council and IQAC. Authority is advised by the council or IQAC for quick recovery to overcome such barriers of learning.
- 2.6.5 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes
- ♦ Institutional efforts in ensuring the intended achievement of learning outcomes have been described erstwhile. The college has been gradually upraising its rate of success in the final examinations and very often it has possessed a rate above the University average pass percentage. Listening to student's grievances, adherent to faculty's report and facilitate possible infrastructure in teaching-learning by the authority are pivotal point in achieving learning outcomes.
- 2.6.6 What are the graduate attributes specified by the college/affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?
- ♦ There is no stated attributes of graduation specified either by the University or by the college. Yet, graduation obtained by the students enables them to acquire academic fidelity, intellectual maturity, self confidence and reliance. Promoting students from under graduate to post graduation is one of the main graduate

attributes of the college. Procuring eligibility through a college degree for a substantial and quality job as well as the capacity building for entrepreneurship to serve the nation are the chief morale graduate attributes of the college. The institute tries to ensure it through academic and social efforts.

3.1 Promotion of Research

- 3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center/s of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?
- ♦ No. there is no recognized research center at the college.
- 3.1.2 Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.
- No research committee is constituted at the college. As an affiliated college does not have the freedom to accommodate Ph.D. and M. Phil degree aspirants. Of course the faculty members carry out research work under recognized universities. However the college authority duly monitors research work pursued by the faculty members.
- 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?
- ◆ For the smooth run of the research projects, the college authority provides all the necessary arrangement to the particular investigator including the release of fund at the time of recruitment. Also the Principal of the college is very serious about guiding the investigator to finish the projects within the stipulated time and publish their findings or outcomes in journals, magazines etc. In short the following points can be noted.
 - Free autonomy to the principal investigator.
 - Timely release of fund.
 - To provide adequate infrastructural facilities.
 - Special leave also granted to the investigator under special needs.
 - Provide free support in terms of technology and information needs.
 - The authority helps in auditing and submission of utilization certificate in due time.
 - Always encourage the faculty to take initiatives for submission of various research projects and pursue research works.
- 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?
- ◆ Till today there is no provision in the college to carry out research activities by the students. But laboratory experiment, field study, preparation of project report etc. are some of the curricular activities which may be considered as the first step to develop scientific temper for future research among the students.
- 3.1.5 Give details of the faculty involvement in active research (Guiding student research, leading Research Projects, engaged in individual/collaborative research activity, etc.
- Some of the faculties of the college are actively engaged in research activities. The details are given below.

- 3.1.7 Provide details of prioritised research areas and the expertise available with the institution.
- There are 17 number of Ph.D. holders in the college. They pursued research works in different fields of interest and subsequently obtained Ph.D. degree from different Universities. Field research is the popular area of research mostly practiced by the science faculty. Social researches are carried on mainly by the arts faculties. Experimental, laboratory research and theoretical research has been the priority of science faculty. Some of the faculties are continuing their research temperament by involving in minor and major research projects. Majority of them are funded by University Grants Commission.
- 3.1.8 Enumerate the efforts of the institution in attracting researchers of eminence to visit the campus and interact with teachers and students?
- ◆ In spite of the limited facilities the college organized lecture programmes where eminent scholars are invited and thus the faculty gets the opportunity to interact and thereby gather information and encouragement for pursuing research etc.
- 3.1.9 What percentage of the faculty has utilized Sabbatical Leave for research activities? How has the provision contributed to improve the quality of research and imbibe research culture on the campus?
- ♦ None of the faculty has availed the sabbatical leave for research till date. Most of them prefer lien-leave for research.
- 3.1.10 Provide details of the initiatives taken up by the institution in creating awareness/advocating/transfer of relative findings of research of the institution and elsewhere to students and community (lab to land)
- ♦ The college authority helps the researchers i.e. the faculty to present their research findings in different conferences or seminars specifically by granting leave. Also the findings of the individual research works are published in journals and magazines. The Principal of the college always play the vital role in inspiring faculty.

3.3 Infrastructure for Research

- 3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?
- ♦ The college has no provision for students to pursue research works. Therefore, the college authority provides least facilities for the collective improvement of research. The departmental laboratories, college general library and also the departmental libraries provide enormous help to the researchers. Departmental computers and internet facilities have been enriching research facilities within the campus.

- ◆ The fact is that there are no research students. Only the interested faculties are doing research works apart from taking the scheduled classes of degree students. The college authority provides the necessary infrastructural facilities to the respective faculty to meet his/her needs.

- ♦ The college has not received any special grant from any agency including UGC for the development of research facilities in the college. Of course individual faculty are receiving fund in the form of minor research projects and major research projects. The Biotech Hub installed at the department of Botany of the college and funded by the DBT, Govt. of India will enhance the research facilities in Biotech research.

- ◆ Does not arise. As the college has not admitted research student in the college, so the college authority need not have to send students outside.

A large number of research papers are being published by refereed national and international journals which are bearing certainly a significant contributions towards the first hand knowledge and information. A considerable number of published books and research papers by the faculty of the institute are considered to be relevant reference materials for higher studies and also helpful for scholars and researchers in the respective fields. Moreover authoritative policy makers and administrators may utilize such published thesis and research papers for implementation of Government plans. Apart from that the academic outputs may attract general readers for obtaining innovative knowledge and may provide information to media for upholding public opinion.

In spite of that some of the faculties are casually engaged in coaching for TET examination (Teachers' Eligibility Test) candidates. They are also appointed for Teachers' Training Course in consultancy with the government of Assam. At least two faculty member of the college every year have been appointed for the consultancy in the services for the entry in services and employment generation scheme through the Career Counseling and Guidance Cell of the college. Some of the faculties are also render services in teaching in KKHSOU.

 - The NSS unit of the college has been rendering various community/social services in the locality and through out the country.
 - The college, since its establishment has been associating the local community as stakeholders by procuring public donations/ and contributions.
 - The college organizes various social, cultural and community reach-out programmes in the locality and thereby intensifies the social affinity.

The major programmes launched by the NSS unit during 2009-2013 include Cycle Rally sponsored by Nehru Yuva Kendra, one day camp of plantation at Nijeswari Mandir area, continuous cleanliness and beautification drive inside college campus before celebration of various occasion such as college week, fresher's social, saraswati puja etc, ex-tempore speech competition on NSS Day, observance of national Youth Day, HIV/AIDS awareness programmes in the various places of the locality, Red Ribbon Express, organizing national level workshop, voluntary blood donation camp etc.

- ♦ The college administration makes necessary arrangement for the commencement of democratic election to constitute the D.K.C students Union which is a common platform for students' legitimate activities. They can acquire skill in policy making, self-governance, democratic right, discipline maintenance, abiding rules and regulations and protest against injustice. Further, students are made aware of environment protection, scientific thinking, logical behaviour and community living throughout their curricular and extracurricular activities in the college life. Such activities may lead the students for a good citizenship role.

- ◆ The institution solicit stakeholder perception on the overall performance and quality of the institution by
 - Arranging Guardian/parent meet

- Inviting the local community in various festive occasion
- Involving Alumni association in policy making

Generally the college authority convenes general meeting of the guardians and leading persons of the area including the students where the participants get the opportunity to express their perception on overall performance and quality of the institution. At the end of the every academic session the college authority gathered information from the outgoing students about the performance and quality of the institution. And hence tries to improve the demerits and drawbacks of the institution.

- Different departments along with the college authority have conducted various outreach programmes every year at different point of time conveniently. These include holding of health camp, literary mission, lesson planning and training in neighboring schools, free medical AIDS camp, observance of World Environment Day, three month computer training free of cost to students (every year) special health camp on physiotherapy etc. Again the college sometimes has also been carrying out outreach programmes those include National Literacy Mission, Adult Education Camp, Folk Festivals to reach out the scattered and unrecognized folk artists of the locality in order to limelight their talents. The college also collaborates in planning and implementing different activities with NGOs, government organizations like Nature Club, Marowari Yuva Manch, Nehru Yuva Mancha, Assam Science Society, Physical Science Society, Gauhati High Court Lawyer's Association (organizing counseling programme on Right to Information-RTI in 2010) and Assam Sahitya Sabha etc. These programmes were seen to be beneficial not only to the students, teachers and authority but also to the common people of the locality as a whole.

- ♦ The institution has promoted the participation of the students and faculty in extension activities through various means. The NSS unit of the college is one of the most leading units in the state of Assam which has been rendering various community/social services.

Through guidance of NSS unit students are encouraged to participate in voluntary blood donation camp. They also participate in the inter university National Integration Camp of NSS, environment awareness programe, antismoking campaign etc.

- The college authority issues certificates and awards to the students who participate in different activities like participation in NSS camp, literary mission to the remote villages, cycle rally etc. This definitely encourage the student community to be more competitive and to make themselves as good citizens and also the involvement in different activities among various people at different places in the

country definitely help them to assimilate and building the capacity to stay every where in the country. Also these activities help them to big exposure which is helpful for their future career.

- ◆ The institution has successfully sponsored various extension programme during last four years. As a step towards community involvement in the reach out activities, the college adopted a nearby backward village in habited by the schedule caste named Gargara w.e.f. 2010 under Palashbari Revenue Circle.

The faculty members have launched various developmental schemes for the upliftment of health and sanitation of the poor villagers. It conducted a demographic survey including population structure, literacy and awareness programme. World environment Day is observed on 5th June annually. Awareness programme on AIDS/HIV and Cancer, a free health check-up camp with 157 patient participants, distribution of medicine free of cost, free education etc. are some of the most remarkable activities of the institution, wherein community involvement was highly encouraging.

Moreover a community improvement programme was also organized with counseling for acquiring self subsistancey and ducks were distributed among the poor widows of the said village.

Besides a consultancy programme was arranged on May 2011 on "Biodiversity Conservation and Environmental Protection", sponsored by Ministry of Environment and Forest, Govt. of India in collaboration with Assam science Society and organized by D.K. College. Four faculty members of our college participated there as resource person without remuneration.

- ♦ So far as the constructive relationship with the institution of the locality is concerned, the faculty members from the college deliver lectures in high schools, higher secondary schools etc in the locality on some important topics at different occasion. Sometime our teachers organize teachers' training camp for the mathematics teachers of the high schools.

4.1 Physical Facilities

- 4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?
- ◆ The following policies have been adopted for enhancement of infrastructural facilities for effective teaching and learning:
 - (i) Installation of Smart classes, smart board with markers pens, audio-visual system like overhead projector, LCD, podiums etc have been done.
 - (ii) The conventional system of chalk and board method is also being used where necessary.
 - (iii) Field trips, excursions within and outside the state are regularly organized for imparting practical and comprehensive knowledge to students.
 - (iv) Seminars, project works, Assignment are scheduled in the curriculum calendar.
 - (v) Sessional test are conducted for regular assessment and evaluation.

4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

- (a) Curricular and co-curricular activities classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.
- The main college campus has 35 well equipped class rooms for conducting regular classes and examinations. Computer facilities are installed in every department. A conference hall is newly constructed with all modern facilities- like audio visual system, smart board, adequate sitting capacities, air conditioning, attached bathrooms (separate for gents and ladies). Each department of the college possesses tutorial classrooms besides normal classrooms. The science departments have well equipped and up to date laboratories. Humanities departments such as Education, geography possess necessary laboratory facilities. The computer laboratory is full-fledged with all facilities including internet. Within the college campus there are large number of plants with identification and naming. A huge teak plantation is present on the nearly hillside and a proposed extended Botanical garden is also being developed. The zoology Department possesses an animal house for rearing of different animals such as rabbit, mice for study and research. Besides, a pisciculture facility is also present near the boy's hostel campus. An institutional Biotech hub is established with modern equipment for study, research and extension programs. A vocational course on Refrigeration Repairing is conducted by the Physics Department, PGDCA courses conducted by the Computer Department, and Folklore study on South Kamrup is being conducted by the Assamese department. Moreover, the zoology department conducts vocational courses on pisciculture. Besides, major and minor projects are being worked out by different departments.
 - (b) Extra-curricular activities—sports, outdoor and indoor games, gymnasium, auditorium, NSS, NCC, cultural activities, Public speaking, communication skills development, yoga, health and hygiene etc.

◆ Infrastructural facilities for outdoor games like cricket, football, volleyball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho and basketball etc. are available in the campus.

A huge sport complex is constructed for indoor games such as table tennis, badminton, carom board, chess etc. A well equipped gymnasium is present in the campus for weightlifting and arm wrestling.

An ultramodern auditorium with huge capacity (1500 approx sitting capacity) is under construction.

The National Service Scheme (NSS) unit of the college is an important platform of extracurricular activities. About 250 student members have been enrolled in this unit for rendering social service inside and outside the campus. The NSS unit of our college has been awarded prizes for rendering distinguished services. NSS unit has a bulletin of its own 'Sewajyoti' published annually.

In the cultural front (as a means of extracurricular activities) our college occupies a distinguished position among the colleges under Gauhati University. The proficiency of the students lies mainly in the areas of drama, songs (both in individual and group level), recitation etc. This is the result of adequate infrastructure facilities, encouragement by the teachers and college authority, expert's guidance and financial support.

For public speaking in the form of lectures, meetings, seminars, workshops and awareness campaign, there is modern and adequate infrastructure within the campus. An ultramodern auditorium is under construction and a well equipped conference hall with podium, projector and modern sound system facilities are already available.

For developing better communication skills among the students, spoken English classes are conducted by the Department of English. Internet facilities are accessible for communication.

Yoga programmes are conducted for students and teachers within the college under the guidance and supervision of expert.

A health unit is established for consultancy and check-up by experienced doctors. The college authority arranges blood donation camp in the college campus from time to time. Awarness programme on Environmental Protection, AIDS and Women Health Care etc. are held regularly.

- 4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? - ◆ D.K. College is a pioneering centre of higher education, located at Mirza, a small but planned township in the southern part of the District of Kamrup in the State of Assam. The college is about 7 kms west of Lokapriya Gopinath Bordoloi International Airport and 17 kms from Gauhati University. The National Highway No. 37 runs through it.

The total land area of the college is 46 bighas (6.35 acres), of which 20 bighas are in the main academic campus and 26 bighas of land contains a Boys' Hostel, a playground and a fishery. Both the campus is well protected by concrete walls. Two new beautiful gates have been constructed at the two entry points of the college campus. Security men with uniform are engaged in both the entry points.

For academic growth, the following infrastructures are available in the campus.

Administrative block: The newly constructed two storied Administrative block is a specious RCC building. It houses the following in the ground floor:

- (a) College office
- (b) College canteen

And in the first floor it houses the following:

- (a) Principal's office
- (b) Conference Hall
- (c) Teachers' common room

Science building: A new science block (3-storied RCC building) is constructed and presently it accommodates four full fledged departments viz. zoology, Botany, Mathematics and Education. An Institutional Biotech Hub with modern equipment is also accommodated in the Science Block. Of course there are two separate buildings for Physics and Chemistry departments.

Building for general class rooms (Assam type buildings): There are all together 25 rooms in this part of old Assam type buildings to conduct the general theory classes.

Library and Computer Science Building: This is also a three-storied RCC building comprising central library, reading rooms, librarian's office, Computer Science department with class rooms (for computer classes only).

Boys' hostel: The Boys' hostel is a big Assam-type Building with all facilities and accommodation for 55 boarders at a time.

Girls' hostel: The Girls' hostel is a big RCC building within the main campus with all modern facilities, which can accommodate 40 students.

There is a separate Assam type quarter for the Hostel superintendent of the girls' hotel.

Auditorium: The construction work of a modern auditorium is in progress and expected to be completed very soon.

Fishery: In the old campus where the boys' hostel is located, there is a big tank for rearing fishes. The college is expected to earn a handsome amount from the fishery.

Power supply: To overcome the problem of erratic electric power supply, three high capacity silent generators are installed in the college campus. Moreover, the college installed transformer and electricity transmission line at its own initiative and expenditures inside the college campus.

New class rooms: As many as 4 classrooms have been newly constructed to accommodate the growing number of students. With this, the total number of classrooms is raised to 35.

Gardens: Two gardens have been newly constructed by the financial support of local donors. A good number of well tiled park benches are also installed for students to spend the leisure periods.

CCTV: The institution installed 16 numbers of CCTV to monitor and record the movement of students within strict vigil.

Statue: The college has founded statues of Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, founder Principal Late G.N. Thakuria and altars like *Swahid Bedi*, college flag hoisting pillar and alters of NSS unit of the college.

Roads: The two entry gates are connected with concrete and weather proof roads and the by-lane to library and Girls hostel are also constructed in the similar ways.

Boundary wall: The whole college campus is well protected by boundary wall. Some parts of the wall are engraved with local folk art form sponsored by the local alumni. The boundary walls around the old college campus including boys' hostel and the fishery have been completed.

Deep tube well: To remove the hurdles of drinking water shortage, a deep tube well has been installed in the college campus to supplement the drinking water facility. A few water coolers and water purifiers have been provided at different points for the benefit of students and teachers.

The projected future expansion:

- (1) Opening of relevant vocational course
- (2) Undertaking minor and major research projects
- (3) Further improvement of the Boys' hostel
- (4) Improvement of Girls' hostel
- (5) Further improvement of playground
- (6) Further plantation in the college and hostel campus
- (7) Construction of Guest house
- (8) New ultra modern auditorium (Under construction)
- (9) Extension of the newly built science building
- (10) Facilities for vehicle parking
- (11) Additional science blocks with well equipped science laboratories to accommodate Physics, Chemistry and new upcoming vocational subjects.

The college authority feels that the existing facilities are at least suitable for comfortable functions of the college. Due to the continuous efforts of the college authority, the department of Assamese is going to start PG courses in Assamese with effect from this academic session. As future plan of the college it can be mentioned that the college authority is interested to start PG courses in other subjects namely Political Science, Education and Zoology.

- ◆ The problem of student's physical disability has not been reported till date. If and when found necessary measure will be taken by the authority.

- One health care unit is available within the Campus. Health Checkup programmes are done time to time by expert Doctors and few medicines are also supplied to the patients from the health care unit in possible cases.

- College has one IQAC cell with its own working room. This cell guides all the important matters of the college.

The women's forum of the college has been functioning and has been organizing regular seminars, lectures and meetings with the aim of women empowerment. Through this forum, the girl students and female teachers are encouraged to devote in the field of sports and cultural activities. Separate office room is provided to the forum.

There is an actively functioning counseling and career guidance cell in the college. The cell organizes training programmes for higher secondary and degree students highlighting the avenues for academic pursuit within and outside the state. The cell also organizes coaching classes for public examinations for recruitment in Banks.

The placement cell of the college works in coordination with the career guidance cell, highlighting the advertisements of job vacancies in Central and State Department and private sector undertakings

The health care centre of the college came into existence only in few years back. The stakeholders are getting benefit from the health care centre. In the college campus there is a canteen with adequate facilities and services.

A modern common room with all facilities is constructed in the Administrative Block for the teaching faculties. A two-storied building is constructed for Girls' Common room with all facilities.

The old Boys' common room is dismantled and therefore the preparations are on for the construction of a new Boys' common room. The college authority has made the necessary arrangement for pure and safe drinking water in the college campus.

The construction work for the modern auditorium is going on in full swing.

- ♦ Yes, the institution has a library advisory committee, comprising all the head of the Departments, Principal, Vice-Principal and Librarian. The significant initiatives implemented by the Committee are
 - (i) To look after the development proposals and budget allocations.
 - (ii) Policy making
 - (iii) To deserve sincerely the requirements of the users of the library and to meet the requirements accordingly.

The library is well equipped with 10 numbers of computers with internet facility for accessing e-resources on all working days.

- ◆ Basically the books are purchased by the purchase committee as per the requisitions submitted by the respective department for speedy supply of books. Through physical verification and auditing, the institution ensures optimal utilization of budget allocation for various activities. Internal audit are done annually and the government of Assam also periodically sends team of auditors for the purpose.

- ◆ The college appoints regular staff for cleaning (campus and toilets), gardening (*mali*) etc. For repair and maintenance of the electrical system, a permanent mechanic is appointed as technical staff. But for repair of power generators, the computer systems, the laboratory equipments and for plumbing systems, works are done under regular service contractors appointed by the college authority.

Moreover, the Physics department installed mini-instrumentation centre for maintenance works.

From time to time the cell organizes programmes among the students by inviting external experts to develop entrepreneurial skill of the students.

- The college constitutes the students union body through formal election and selected secretaries of the respective portfolios like games, sports, magazine, music and culture etc. are responsible to arrange various events in their concerned fields especially in the College week, Fresher social, College foundation day and in various other occasions. The Vice-principal being the union in-charge supervises all these events through different professor in charge. Students adjudged best in different competitions are awarded with prizes and certificates in the annual college weak festival. Thus they are encouraged to participate in extra curricular activities. Even students are selected on the basis of performance to participate in various events of youth Festivals organized by Gauhati University and other institution. To encourage the willing and interested students there is special provision for flexibility in internal examination, admission fees relaxation

etc. College facilitates the student's community with sports materials, sports uniforms, musical instruments and other infrastructure like suitable playground, gymnasium hall, indoor sports complex etc. At present a modern auditorium equipped with stage and sitting arrangement is under construction. Photographs of the students with outstanding performance in such extra-curricular activities are printed in the Annual College magazine to encourage student's involvement in those areas.

- ◆ Till date no such structured mechanism is organized as questioned. Those which are existed are mentioned erstwhile.

It also represents the student community in different platforms outside the college right from government, university, state or national level student organizations. It shares in various programmes of social and academic aspects organized at inter college, university/inter-university and national level. Every student has to contribute for the union at a minimum amount. The college authority also has to allocate a budget to mitigate the shortfall of major events like college week, magazine etc. Sometimes state government approves money for magazine publication, sports, college week etc.

The body is constituted by democratic election where the regular students exercise their franchise to elect their representatives. For the performance of their respective activities the College authority provides fund in different heads.

CRITERION VI: GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

- ◆ The vision of the college centres round its strong desire to become a centre of excellence in the academic field in the entire North Eastern region. Apart from imparting education, it endeavours to motivate the young generation to establish a social order based on dignity of labour as well as moral and spiritual values. The college also aims at imparting futuristic education and instilling high standards of discipline among its students. Moreover, it aims to foster scientific and rational temperament among its students and faculty members which will greatly benefit the whole human race.

The mission of the college is not only to achieve excellence in the field of higher education but also to promote physical, intellectual and moral development of the students. The famous hymn of the Upanishada-"*Tamaso Ma Jyotirgamaya*" – engraved in the emblem of the college– very well reflects the mission of the college. It has always endeavoured to drive away the darkness of ignorance and usher in the light of knowledge.

Both the vision and mission of the college are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders through various fruitful exercises. Firstly, all are made to realize their responsibility in making Dakshin Kamrup College, Mirza one of the best institutions of higher education in North East India. Secondly, the college stead firstly upholds highest standards of moral and spiritual values so that everyone associated with it are encouraged to follow suit. Thirdly, by organizing social service camps and associating itself with various programmes for maintaining/developing civic amenities in the villages around the college it tries to underline the dignity of labour.

- ♦ The college governing body is the sole authority to design and implement its quality policy and plans. In the meeting of the college Governing Body, problems are discussed with exchange of views then necessary plans and programmes are finalized and thus the principal of the college with the help of the faculty carryout the activities accordingly.

- ◆ In tune with the National Higher Education Policy the declared vision of the college emphasizes on imparting quality and job oriented education with the aim of creating a quality skilled man power based in the areas surrounding the college. Also in tune of the said policy the college aims at fostering scientific and rational temperament among the students and staff of the college. The college gives importance in exposing the students to basic realities of life through various field trips, workshops, seminars etc.

The creations of a moral, intellectual and physical quality of the students are the main pillar of the declared mission of the college. This pursuit of the college amply conforms to the National Higher Education Policy.

The college expects to create a strong sense of environment awareness among the students. To translate the stated vision and mission the college authority has taken a lot of initiatives such as –

- (i) Expansion of hostel facilities
- (ii) The college started different innovative courses to attract students from different places.

The courses are-

- Pisciculture
- Refrigeration and A.C. maintenance
- Establishment of institutional level Biotech-Hubs (I.B.T Hubs)
- Tourism and Hospitality management course.

Under the broad guide lines set by the UGC and government the entire teaching learning in the college maintain and improved through management's commitment leadership as well as the involvement of teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. Increasing involvement of the management in the teaching learning process is reflected in the continuous improvement of the various facilities introduced in the college for enhancement of the quality of teaching-learning process. The college management has already provided smart class facilities etc for betterment of teaching-learning process.

- 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?
- Academic responsibilities like regular classes, departmental seminars, workshops, etc are defined and allotted by the head of the institution /management in consultation with the head of the department of each individual department. The responsibilities regarding examinations and other extra-academic activities (extra-curricular/co-curricular) are allotted through respective committee forwarded by the management. Besides, the principal periodically meets the teaching staff to elaborate the allotments of various responsibilities relating to the smooth conduct of various aspects of the college.

Parents meeting are held in the college from time to time to gather the feed back in issue relating to academic and administrative matter of the college. In certain cases the authority approaches the leading citizens of the area to elicit their views and suggestions on different matters of the college. For the smooth conduct

- of final examinations, the examination committee is framed where the leading citizen of the locality are included as members.
- 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?
- ◆ The college management fully encourages and supports the faculty members towards involvement in various institutional processes. There are several processes being curved out in the college regularly. Important among them are admission process, class management, examination process, maintenance of discipline and the students' union election etc. Respective committees are formed and periodically reconstituted for effective improvement of efficiency of those committees in order to ensure smooth conduct of the institutional processes of the college throughout the year. The Principal takes extra care to ensure the involvement of all concerned (the teachers, the non-teaching staff and the students) in the efficient conduct of all processes. The conduct of the process is regularly reviewed by the management in consultation with the teaching and non-teaching staff.
- 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?
- ◆ The Principal manages the college affairs, both at the administrative and academic level with outmost efficiency. Under his able leadership the college can boast of a healthy style in respect of both managerial and academic activities.
- 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?
- The college authority exercise its administration a multilateral decentralized manner in spite of the supremacy of the Governing Body, the college has altogether 28 different organizational bodies for enactment of various activities. Al the executive bodies are formed democratically, discuss relevant issues under its own jurisdiction and resolved independently. Final decisions are conveyed to the higher authority through proper procedure. Administration pays more heed on the academic requirements in the teaching-learning and evaluation process and offers administrative or financial help/cooperation. Faculties of both teaching and non-teaching or student community from various departments/section may raise their individual opinion/grievance in proper platform which are conveyed to the administration for settlement. The organizational bodies like Students' Union, Teachers' Unit, Womens' Forum, Employees' Union, Academic Council and Grievances Redreessal Cell are usually instrumental to exchange opinion and suggestions.
- 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.
- ♦ Yes. The college promotes the culture of participative management. As per the guidelines of NAAC the institute formed the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in 2003. Since then it has been monitoring the fluctuation of internal quality and coordination. Besides, communication gap is hardly felt in between teaching-learning administration. Because of the effective role of the Governing Body, Students' Union, Teachers' Unit, Womens' Forum etc. almost all

requirement/grievances are reported to the college authority and mitigated in a creative manner. Thus internal coordination and cooperation is intensified.

Generally after the declaration of results of final examination, the principal convene a general meet of teachers where every academic aspect are discussed elaborately and decisions are taken for future course of action for further improvement so as to impart quality education to the students.

- ♦ The college authority is very keen to keep up the existing programmes in tune with the present day needs. From this academic session the college is going to start PG courses in Assamese. In the coming days the college authority is interested and proceeds accordingly to start PG courses in Zoology, Political Science and Education also.

- The college has at present twenty eight well organized bodies to efficiently manage all the academic and administrative activities. Like other provincialized colleges of Assam, as per the guidelines of Assam Provincialized College Management Act, 2006 the institution has also a Governing Body constituted by the government selected members which is empowered to intervene with necessary action in the internal management of the college. The Governing Body having the principal as its secretary is the sole authority to approve or nullify all major decisions concerning financial, administrative or academic activities of the college. - The management of the college provides all the necessary and up-to-date infrastructural facilities for high quality teaching-learning processes. So far as the class room teaching is concerned along with the traditional method, audio-visual systems are provided. To make teaching-learning more attractive Smart Board classrooms are also arranged. Of course Smart Boards are not available in all the class rooms. Each department is well equipped with computer facilities with internet connection which are easily accessible to the students. Again all the departments have departmental library full with important books so that both teacher and students can fruitfully utilize the existing facilities.

So far as the teachers are involved in research activities it must be mentioned that quite a good number of teachers are pursuing research activities. Some of them are doing research works for the Ph.D. degree while some other are continuing research activities with the financial aid of UGC in the form of Minor Research Projects and also Major Research Projects.

The institution involved the community in its extension activities in several occasions and especially during holidays. It should be stated that the college had involved a section of well to do local community members for infrastructural development and beautification inside the college campus. The institution performs various collaborative activities with some local bodies and village communities. For instances the college has organized a state level UGC sponsored workshops on July, 2011 to train up High school teachers of the locality in collaboration with Palasbari Sahitya Sabha. Moreover, the college organizes various interactive sessions in the college premises among the student

communities of South Kamrup area in collaboration with South Kamrup Students' Union and National Students' Union of India of South Kamrup branch.

The principal manages the college affairs both at the administrative and academic level with his best capacities. Under the able leadership of the principal the college can boast of a healthy style in respect of human resource management. Academic responsibilities like regular classes which are the main components towards the human resource development, departmental seminars and workshops etc. are allotted by the head of the institution in consultation with the Head of the department of each academic department. The responsibilities regarding examinations and other extra-academic activities are allotted through the respective committee forwarded by the principal.

Besides, the principal periodically meets the teaching staff to elaborate the allotments of various responsibilities for the human resource management. The college authority is not much involved in the industry interactive programmes.

- The affiliating university has not given autonomy to the college.
- 6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?
- The college has a formal Grievance Redressal Cell for the students as well as for the staff. Principal and vice-Principal along with selected faculty members of the cell discuss all sorts of grievances raised by the students and employees. This cell amicably settles the grievances and in certain cases the matter is conveyed to the Governing Body for satisfactory solution of problems. But the number of such case is meager. It is worth mentioning that most of the problems are raised through the platform of Students' union, Teachers' unit, Women's Forum and Employees Union.
- 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?
- ♦ Not at all.
- 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If 'yes', what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?
- ◆ The institution has not a formal mechanism for analyzing students' feedback on institutional performance. In general the college authority hold meeting after the announcement of results of final examination by the university and discuss ins and outs of all the results and thereby takes the appropriate measures for further improvement specially to boost up the academic activities.

6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

- 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non teaching staff?
- ◆ To enhance the professional development of the teaching faculty, the college has sufficient infrastructural facilities. There are separate departments for each subject with departmental libraries. Every department has computer sets with internet facilities. Teachers are facilitated with smart class, OHP, well equipped science laboratories, library reading room, teachers' common room etc. A well equipped conference hall is newly constructed for arranging seminar, conference etc. The department of Assamese is going to start PG course from 2013. An institutional Biotech Hub is likely to be supporting research outcomes in the field of biotechnology. Apart from the huge number of books, the college library is also

- well equipped with a number of news papers and e-journals supporting the professional development of teaching faculties.
- 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?
- The college authority has the flexibility in granting leaves to the faculties for any faculty improvement programmes. Teachers are enabled for engaging themselves in research work like Ph.D., Minor or Major research project, short term course, refreshers course, orientation programme, seminar, workshops or conference held outside the college. They are also encouraged by the authority to convene seminar or conference etc in the college. Moreover teachers are empowered with widerange experiences from extensive examination works like question paper setting, curriculum designing, assistant zonal officer in-charge, examiner, scrutinizer, tabulator, external examiner, supervisor etc. Moreover, publication of textbooks or any other books are achieved by individual efforts, but the college authority has contributed in publication of some edited books in various occasions.
- 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.
- ◆ There is no any formal performance appraisal system of staff in the college of its own. Information on multiple activities are kept in record by respective bodies of the concerned fields. Important performance appraisals are noted by the individual service record by the authority which are considered in API evaluation for staff promotion and sent for the approval of higher authority which is mandatory. At present such records are tried to be restored systematically in the newly formed college documentation centre so as to support the IQAC in internal policy making.
- 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?
- ♦ Although the documentation centre is in its initial stage, records of faculty's performance are used by the college management in multiple purposes. Especially in the policy making meeting of GB, IQAC, Academic council, NAAC steering committee such records are reviewed. The good use of better appraisal is well reflected in staff promotion.
- 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?
- The college has very limited scope to install welfare scheme for its employees. There are three saving funds and a welfare society constituted by the college employees and also those are contributed by each and every member on monthly basis. Almost all members have been availing the loan facilities since its inception at a meager rate of interest. The interests from the beneficiaries are audited annually and dividends are distributed after the audit meeting. The welfare fund provides financial aid during the time of employee's distress like accident, diseases etc. Every member is gifted with a handsome amount by the welfare

- society at the time of retirement. Some other limited welfare schemes are equally available to the employees as per the existing govt. rules and regulations.
- 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?
- ◆ There is no any special initiative to attract or retaining the eminent faculty. Of course the short distance from the state capital, location along the national highway 37 at Mirza, a big beautiful green campus with enormous infrastructure inside, adjacent to the parent university (Gauhati University, 17 KM from college), good academic atmosphere, good result and administration, unbiased and friendly attitude of the college authority, a huge staff of intellectual elite, good drinking water, parking and canteen facilities are some of the host of factors that can easily attract and retaining eminent faculty.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

- The college G.B. with the principal as its secretary is the pivotal screw of the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of financial resources. The eleven membered G.B. is the sole authority to approve or reject any financial matters. All the subordinate bodies like IQAC, Academic council, building and construction, examination, admission or unions etc may place their advices or demands in G.B. meeting which undertakes final decision after review and justification. The effective and efficient use of financial resource is automatically reflected in the activities of college all round the year. In spite of that all the financial matters are annually audited by a govt. certified auditor. Govt. and any other stakeholders have every right to easy access to go through the financial audit of the college as and when necessary.

- ♦ Both the internal and external audit is done by the college authority regularly. Internal audit is audited by a Govt. certified Chartered Accountant annually. The last audit was reported in March 2012. External audit is done by the Govt. appointed auditor whenever felt necessary. The major audit objections if any are highlighted in the report itself. [Audited reports will be available at the time of peer team on site visit]

 - (v) Rent received from outside organization for using infrastructure of the college.
 - (vi) Allowing installation of ATM inside college campus to Central Bank of India.

All such receipts are used for the infrastructure development of the college subject to approval of the G.B.

 - (iii) To organize workshops, seminars etc for quality enhancement for students, teachers and office stuff.

- ◆ Yes. There are external members in the IQAC of the college according to the guideline of NAAC. The external IQAC members provide valuable suggestions towards the all-round development of the college.

- ◆ Students are adhered in the IQAC meeting through students' union representative. The alumni members also share in the various decisions which are taken in the IQAC.
- **e.** How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?
- ◆ The decisions taken in the IQAC are communicated through the Head of the institution to all the departments including office stuff and also placed in the Academic council's meeting or G.B. meeting.

- ◆ The institution has a strong integrated framework for its academic and administrative quality maintenance. The students union, the teachers' unit, the office staff are all well communicated for every policy making and hence finally placed in the college G.B. for giving the final shape of all the plans and programmes.

- ◆ The institution has no any special provision for imparting such training to its stuff.

- ◆ The Principal of the college convene academic council's meeting at the end of every academic session where academic matters related to teaching-learning and evaluations are discussed. Important proceedings are sent to IQAC and college G.B. for necessary remedies. Results and statistics are annually published in the college Magazine and Prospectus where pictures of the academic audit are properly reflected.

- As the college is running with a recommended curriculum of Gauhati University, therefore the institution has limited scope to align its internal quality assurance on its own way.

- ♦ For continuous review of teaching-learning process in the college, there are so many systems where all these matters are discussed elaborately. These are the academic council, teachers' unit, Examination committee, students' union body etc. and above all the college Governing body.

- ♦ The institution communicates its quality assurances and performances through the prospectus of the college. Also certain progress and developments are published in the college Magazine which is published annually. Again if felt necessary, guardians meeting is also convened.

- ◆ The college has not formally conducted any kind of green audit inside the college campus. Of course every member of the college family is fully aware of environmental protection of the college campus. They always contribute to enrich the environmental development in the college campus.

 - * Energy conservation
 - ◆ For the conservation of energy, the college authority takes the possible initiative like use of CFL bulbs and tube light instead of usual electric bulbs. Apart from that the bearers who look after the uses of electrical appliances do not allow the unnecessary use of electric power. Also all the students are advised not to switch on any electric appliances where there is no necessity.
 - * Use of renewable energy
 - ◆ The college is considering for installation of solar disc to utilize solar energy.
 - * Water harvesting
 - ◆ There is no such provision till date for the harvesting of rain water.
 - * Check dam construction
 - ◆ Not applicable
 - * Efforts for Carbon neutrality
 - ◆ Considering the carbon neutrality in the college campus open burning of any waste product is not allowed while in the college canteen as well as in the two college hostels instead of traditional oven, LPG cylinders are used.
 - * Plantation
 - ◆ The entire college campus is planted with sufficient number of different plants including valuable timbers like Teak, Sal, Auger etc and a variety of flowers. Also the hill slope in the back side of the college is covered with abundant natural plants. It is pleasing to note that all the plants in the college campus are identified with proper naming and labeling by the Department of Botany of the college.
 - * Hazardous waste management
 - ◆ For the Hazardous waste management, there is appropriate arrangement in the college campus.
 - * e-waste management
 - ◆ All the e-waste products are stored in an isolated safe place. These are disposed with the help of outside recycling parties as and when necessary.

35. SWOC analysis of the department and Future plans :

The Department of Economics faces certain shortcomings and weaknesses. The department is plagued mainly by shortages of permanent teachers as the temporary faculties cannot develop the same dedication as their permanent counterpart. The teaching efficiency of the temporary/contractual teachers is somewhat below that of the permanent counterpart as the former is not entitled for any Refresher/Orientation courses. The insufficient room space of the department is a major weakness which hampers proper functioning of the department to a great extent.

Notwithstanding the shortages and weaknesses as above the department great opportunities to develop itself into a fully fledged department when the plan for launching the P.G. classes comes true along with some other vocational

courses which are being considered currently. However, the department faces the challenges of molding the mediocre students (coming to the department mostly from the rural areas) into competitive students at graduate and post graduate level besides turning them into respectable citizens.

Strength:

• The department of Zoology has six qualified teachers. The teachers of the department are pursuing various research works pertaining to burning issues of environment and biodiversity conservation etc. Many research papers have been published in the leading national and international journals by the teachers. Some teachers have published books for the benefit of the student community. The teachers of the department have both Major and Minor Research Projects funded by the UGC. Some teachers are the members of various scientific organizations viz. Assam Science Society, Zoological Society of Assam etc. The teachers of the department acted as Resource Person in various Workshops Seminars, held different organizations. Besides, some teachers acted as M.Phil. Guide for completion of M. Phil. to researches. The department performing education extension programme in the nearby areas. Above all the department maintains good academic results which is the real strength.

Weakness:

• Space is a major constrain for performing theory as well as practical classes. The authority has consented to provide extra rooms in the near future.

Opportunity:

• The department has four Career Oriented Courses *viz*. Certificate Course in Sericulture, Certificate Course in Apiculture, Certificate in Pisciculture and Certificate Course in Poultry. The students have the opportunity to undertake these courses for generation of self employment. The department has a plan to open Masters Degree in Zoology in future.

Challenges:

• We have a challenge to uplift this department to the level of national standard.



Post-accreditation Initiatives

The college has already undergone the accreditation process by NAAC and obtained B⁺ Grade. Some of the recommendations forwarded by the Peer team during the first visit to the college along with immediate responses are briefly stated below.

Area of concern and suggestions

- Although the results of students of this college are reportedly above the University average the rate of unsuccessful candidates needs to be brought down to acceptable limits. While some departments such as Mathematics, Education, Political Science, History, Zoology and Assamese have occasionally shown commendable results, other should not be allowed to lag behind.
- The number of teaching days needs to be increased to 180 days and suitable teaching-learning methods need to be used for effective completion of entire syllabus. The affiliating University may be requested to frame the examination scheduled in such a manner that it does not disrupt the normal teaching schedule.
- Computer centre with adequate numbers of computers for different departments.
- Auditorium to accommodate at least 300 students is required.
- Girls' Hostel is needed.
- Adequate audio-visual and other

Response by the college

With the special initiatives of every department of the college, in recent past the students from this college showed good results. Almost every year pass percentage of the college is above the University average. Now-a-days it is encouraging for the college authority that the number of unsuccessful candidate is reduced remarkably.

As from the report the number of teaching days in the college is less than 180 days. That was true but not due to the fault of the college administration. During those days there was frequently *Assam Bandh* called by different organizations causing severe loss in class days. Presently the situation is changed and therefore in the last academic year teaching days go beyond 182 days.

Each and every department is well equipped with up to date computer facilities.

The construction work of the ultramodern auditorium is going on in full swing. But since the construction work is not finished till date the shortage of auditorium exists.

A well protected and well equipped Girls' Hostel is constructed in the main college campus to accommodate nearly 40 girls students.

Audio-visual and other teaching aids are

The college is still lagging behind in this particular area. But efforts are on.

For the non-existence of remarkable industrial base in the area the college is not capable of establishing such linkages.

• Students exchange programmes needed.

Due to the busy schedule of the parent University curriculum, students exchange programmes are not found effective in the college.

• National and International linkages are to be set up.

National and International linkages are setup through different Universities of India, UGC, NAAC etc.

 Value-based education, yoga, music education should be started. The faculty has adequate internal resources to impart training in music. Training for musical education are imparted to the students occasionally.

• Internet facility is non-existent.

The internet facilities are easily accessible to all since the recommendation of last Peer team visit to the college.
